At the time of writing this article. I was fresh off the heels of a terrific vacation to visit my family back east and get in some whitewater rafting along the Lower New River in West Virginia. (For those of you who like a little thrill in your life, I can recommend a trustworthy outfitter to help you with everything you need for such an adventure, along with a trusty guide or two.) If you recall, I went rafting last year for the first time and immediately got hooked. But last year, the river was 4 feet below normal summer pool. This year the river was at 12+ feet ABOVE normal summer pool. They do not run that stretch of the river at 14 feet above pool, or at a volume at or above 32,000 cubic feet per second (cfs). This year it was running at 30,000 cfs! To put this all into perspective, a cubic foot of water is similar in size to a basketball. Now, the river is roughly 162 feet across on average at this level. Imagine 162 basketballs times 30,000! Now that was how much water was running past us per second! I new that this was going to be a wild ride and to top it off, I had my immediate family along with me this time in addition to my sister and various cousins and in-laws! I knew that we needed to trust, not only our guide, but something greater than all of us to get us down river safely! All I could think of was a familiar line I had heard once before, "Trust in your guide and fear no danger".

We had two rafts to accommodate all of us in our party. We requested our guides ahead of time, Matt and Koreen, ahead of time. My sister requested Matt in her raft (ladies, imagine Captain Jack Sparrow) because of his dapper looks, oh and by the way, adept guide skills. I requested Koreen for our raft, since she is very funny and for a woman, very strong (darn near a body builder, but not quite). If my family was going to "go for a swim" (involuntarily) as they say down there, I wanted Koreen to be there to pull us back in to the raft. She also has 12 years of experience under her belt.

"Trust in your guide and fear no danger".

Now my daughter Cara, as most of you know, is what I would call "fun sized". She only weighs about 100lbs and is just......
"From the West" continued..... under 5 feet tall. The minimum age for someone to ride the "Lower New" is 12 years old, under normal conditions. With the river running this high, I was a little apprehensive. When we arrived at the put-in spot, we asked Koreen if Cara could ride, not along the side tubes of the raft, but in the middle where we thought there would be less chance of her "going for a swim". (Did I mention that Cara is not a strong swimmer?) Koreen took one look at her and said, "No one sits in the middle on my raft". "Besides", she exclaimed, "you have a better chance of staying in if you paddle along with the rest of the group".

"Trust in your guide and fear no danger".

Well, with much apprehension, (especially when we saw the first wave) Cara trusted Koreen and rode up on the tubes with everyone else. Koreen made sure to offer lots of encouragement to Cara along the way. To make a long story short, Cara stayed

in the raft the whole way, despite the onslaught of countless "wave trains" and nasty "hydraulics". Koreen made sure that along the way, we were all aware of the dangers at every rapid and where we should go if we went for a swim. In addition, she made sure that we got lots of practice in with different paddling maneuvers during the calm pools and were able to respond to her commands as we traversed the very fast and angry ancient New River.

"Trust in your guide and fear no danger".

At the end of the day, we all gathered in the pub back at The Rivermen campus, our outfitters for the journey. They like to display our trip's rafting video (there are half baked "video boaters" who kayak alongside our trip who take pics and shoot video). The guides clean themselves up and meet us at the pub and share laughs with us as we recall our adventure. We also take this time to thank them profusely for watching over us and ensuring that we have a fun and safe voyage along the way. As tradition prevails, we also take this time to tip them and share a bevvy or two. (In true Anoka Lodge fashion, I tipped Koreen very well for her expertise and wisdom!)

"Trust in your guide and fear no danger".

This experience was one which held several lessons. The most important was to learn to trust someone who has more wisdom than yourself, especially in the face of uncertainty and danger. And, the second, never to leave your mouth open when you crash into a wave, unless you happen to like the taste of muddy river water! But most of all, I learned that life can be like a river. But most of all, we need to make sure that we are acting as guides to our less experienced Brothers. So, I ask you, have you been able to help guide someone through the river we call "Masonry"? When someone calls upon you, can you be trusted to be there for a worthy Brother in distress? Do you have another Brother you can look up to as a guide? I know that I have many Brothers I can call guides and I am very thankful for their wisdom and expertise. Now as far as tipping them, well, that is a different story....

Stay well my Brothers. Follow your guides and fear no danger.

Greetings Brethren of Anoka Lodge #30,

As I write this article tonight, I am thinking of our newest Entered Apprentice Brothers who will join the Lodge in September, and their introduction to Masonry and Anoka Lodge#30. The Entered Apprentice degree is the first impression of Masonic ritual, and is a night no Brother ever forgets. But what about the first introduction to Masonry and the Lodge through the process of petitioning and interviews that lead up to the Entered Apprentice degree.

When I decided to become a Mason, I contacted the Lodge, and within two days, I had received an e-mail from the Worshipful Master inviting me to dinner at the Lodge. When I showed up for dinner, I was introduced to many Masons, toured the Lodge, and had dinner with the Brethren. It was a little overwhelming going to a place where I knew no one, trying to remember names and faces that went together, and not knowing what questions to ask or what to talk about. But I went home with a good feeling of being welcome. I signed my petition and waited for the petitioning process to take place.

The next part of the process was me receiving a call from three Masons of the Lodge wanting to meet with and interview me (later I learned that these were called investigations). While the visit to the Lodge was a good experience, I feel that my first real introduction to Masonry came during the investigations. It was a chance to sit down with a Brother of the Lodge and ask questions, listen to information about how the Lodge worked, and meet someone I might recognize when I next visited the Lodge.

I cannot emphasize enough how important these investigations were to me, and how important they are to our new candidates. It really is their first introduction to Anoka Lodge #30 and to Masonry. One thing that impressed me, and made me feel as if

the Lodge wanted me to join, was how soon I was contacted for the investigations after submitting my petition. I was also impressed with how friendly the Brothers were, and how they were ready to answer any questions I had about the Lodge and Masonry.

The Brothers who conduct the investigations are selected randomly from the membership of the Lodge. If you receive a letter requesting that

you investigate a candidate, I urge you to take action and set up a time for the investigation as soon as possible. This will show the candidate that they are important. Meet with them and talk to them about why they want to join the Lodge. Answer the questions that they have about Masonry and the Lodge. Be friendly and cheerful, and be sure to invite them to visit the Lodge for dinner on meeting nights.

After the investigation, please return the investigation report to the Lodge Secretary as soon as possible. This allows the Lodge to vote upon the petitions in a timely manner. Also very important in this investigation process is your time. If you receive a request from the Lodge, and do not have the time, or are not able to set up a time to investigate the candidate, please notify the Lodge Secretary as soon as you can, so that they can then notify a different Brother to request the investigation.

Let us all work together to make our new candidate's introduction to Masonry and the Lodge a great experience, from that first visit to the Lodge through the Entered Apprentice degree.

## **ROYAL ARCH**

#### **Origins & History**

In January's Royal Arch article I included this excerpt from the Grand Lodge of Mn.



"Pure Ancient Freemasonry


consists of but three degrees, viz., that of the Entered Apprentice, Fellow Craft, and Master Mason. Including The Supreme Order Of The Holy Royal Arch"

But Is there any real evidence though that The Holy Royal Arch was originally part of the degrees of a Master Mason?

Here is a very interesting excerpt from an article by: E. Comp. G.S. Jassar, PGStB, P2ndProvGPrin.

"in the "Book of Constitutions" written by Anderson in 1723, in which he says: "The Master of a particular Lodge has the right and authority of congregating the members of his Lodge into a Chapter". This would suggest that the so-called Chapter must have practiced some rite or ceremony, which differed from the ceremonies normally performed in the Lodge. If this work was connected with the Royal Arch, such as something similar to the "passing of the veils", it must have been regarded as a part of Craft Masonry yet differing from the normal Degrees. As this regulation was incorporated by Anderson in his "Constitutions" and worded in such a fashion, it shows that whatever was meant by a "Chapter" was already in common practice and accepted by 1723.

The first Premier Grand lodge, or "Moderns" as they later became known was founded in 1717. It initially concentrated on regularizing the First, Second and Third Degrees. Although it realized that some of its adherent Lodges worked the Royal Arch, it gave no official recognition or support to the ceremony. It is interesting to note that although the ceremony was not regarded as an integral part of the three Craft Degrees, (Next Page)



it was nevertheless worked in ordinary Craft Lodges at that time.

On the other hand, the "Antients" Grand Lodge, which broke away in 1751, acknowledged the Royal Arch with enthusiasm. Laurence Dermott, its second Grand Secretary, described the Royal Arch as "...the root, heart and marrow of Freemasonry". It was openly conferred as a Fourth Degree in its Lodges with the consent and approval of the "Antients", who became known as the Royal Arch Continued..... "Grand Lodge of the Four Degrees". Indeed, their first set of Rules and Regulations states that "Ancient Masonry consists of Four Degrees the Apprentice, the Fellow Craft and the Sublime Degree of Master" and goes on to provide that "... a Brother well versed in these Degrees and having discharged the offices of his Lodge, particularly that of Master, is eligible to be admitted to the Fourth Degree, the Holy Royal Arch". The Rules also state that "Every Regular Warranted Lodge possesses the power of forming and holding Lodges in each of its several Degrees, the last of which, from its preeminence, is denominated among Masons, a Chapter". At that time, separate Chapters still did not exist and so one was opened in the Craft Lodge under the authority of its Warrant in order to confer the Degree."




