If you get your information out in that newsletter then you have taken the most effective means of getting your message out.
- Lodge Bulletin Board. Use the bulletin board at the bottom of the stairs in the club room. I will be moving the calendar over to another location to open up some more real estate. Please only use that board for official events and communications for our various committees and appendant bodies. Please do not use it for solicitation of business and such.
- · After Dinner Presentations. Consider using that time after dinner to communicate events or even make a presentation. You have a captive audience, why not take advantage of it?

Brothers, I for one hate having to set up more rules (we have enough already!), but we need to do something to make our meetings more enjoyable for those who cannot spend 2-3 hours in a Lodge meeting. I addition, Grand Lodge suggests that our meetings should be no longer than 1 hour in length. I don't know if we will ever get to that point, nor am I sure I want to, but we should do something to make our meetings more efficient. I ask for your support in these efforts in advance and appreciate your attention in these matters.

FROM THE L.E.O.

Mark Maser Mason Philosophy

King David, the great warrior king, was also a great poet, musician, and writer of prophetic visions. The Book of Psalms, written by him some 3000 years ago, contains many allegorical visions and serves as a moral guide, even in this advanced civilization of our modern day.

The 4th degree of the York Rite refers to Psalm 118v22: "The stone which the builders refused has become the headstone of the corner". The ritual alludes to the stone as placed in the building of King Solomon's Temple. What is the meaning of this in a moral sense?

We find in history many cases of persons, who like the "stone rejected" were outcast for their differences, only to become martyrs of prejudice and intolerance, bigotry, legalized murder, enslavement, apartheid, etc. These men were rejected because their ideologies did not conform to the then accepted rules. In Masonic terms they did not match the plans on the trestle board; they were not properly hewn, marked, and numbered for our understanding and did not pass the sensor, examiner, or overseer. In spite of enduring cruel treatment under intolerable conditions they found the strength to shape the history of world affairs in religion and politics. These men were catalysts of remarkable changes in thought, bringing about social justice and the righting of wrongs.

Dr. Pasteur was laughed at, persecuted, and even physically attacked for daring to tell the world that germs really did exist and are harmful. How could we believe in the harm of microscopic life forms we could not see? It was OUR failure to comprehend the real shape of things, not his. The washing of hands was considered useless and rejected. Today his name is memorable for pasteurized milk and by his system of curing many diseases the world over.

This degree teaches us above all, tolerance, to be

patient with our fellows and not condemn simply because his ideas clash with ours (after all, our ideas likewise clash with his). Learn to travel great lengths to understand, and when you can't reach his understanding, live in peace. Only the Great Architect has the right to decide who to accept or reject, reward or punish, and orchestrate the true order of life. One day He may decide to raise any one of us for our precocious understanding, after all, there is always a first for everything.

It has been a joy to lead the Chapter and really brought home to us how much Eastern Star has enriched our lives.


