This month's theme will be Easter and few interesting facts about this worldwide holiday. Easter and the holidays that are related to it are moveable feasts which do not fall on a fixed date in the Gregorian or Julian calendars which follow only the cycle of the sun; rather, its date is determined on a lunisolar calendar similar to the Hebrew calendar.

The First Council of Nicaea established two rules, independence of the Jewish calendar and worldwide uniformity, which were the only rules for Easter explicitly laid down by the council. No details for the computation were specified; these were worked out in practice, a process that took centuries and generated a number of controversies.

It has come to be the first Sunday after the ecclesiastical full moon that occurs on or soonest after 21 March. Easter is linked to Passover and the Exodus from Egypt recorded in the Old Testament through the Last Supper, his sufferings, and crucifixion of Jesus that preceded the resurrection.

In the upper room during the Last Supper he prepared himself and his disciples for his death. Paul states, "Get rid of the old yeast that you may be a new batch without yeast. For Christ, our Passover lamb, has been sacrificed" Source Wiki. Happy Easter to all!

Greetings from the South!

I have my chisel. I have my mallet. I have a piece of stone in my hands, and I look down at it with a bit of fear and trepidation. When I look at that stone, I see something in the stone, it is a shape, but it is not oblong or square, but has a unique use. With that image in my head, I begin my work, the sound of wooden tools muffled at mid-day.

At the beginning of the Mark Master degree from the Royal Arch, we contemplate the keystone. During the degree there is a primary lesson that we are taught, just like in all degrees, but it is not the same type of a lesson. As I reflect on the past, I am faced with a new view of that profound degree, a view that recalls a new lesson, maybe one that is not so obvious.

In the Mark Master, we are taught that no man is entitled to wages, should he not be found worthy. He must first work diligently in the quarries, there to exhibit specimens of his skill. What a parallel to our own Blue Lodge degrees – we are not able to pass on to the next degree until we are able to display a specimen of our skills. That skill, in this case, is the memory work of the preceding degree, something we stress to our candidates. It's not because we want to see how well they can memorize, but more especially whether they put in the work to make their degrees even more meaningful.

In the days of Solomon's temple, the craftsmen would work to provide stone that would pass the overseer's square – in other words, they were purpose built to fit the temple. If you could pass the square, obviously an allusion to the Master's jewel, you were eligible to receive your wages. However, in the Mark Master degree there is an issue. The young Fellowcraft...

Having just finished sitting in the East for my first time in Lodge, I am reminded of that allegory. The young Fellowcraft, not having a specimen of his skill, found an abandoned stone among the cast-off stones of the temple. Thinking this was easy, and knowing that he, himself was skilled, he picked up the stone and turned it in to the Overseers for their inspection.

And there it went sideways... but as with so many of our degrees, there is a secret – and if you go through the degree of Mark Master you will find that little bit extra.

But the main lesson of this degree is not how to chisel stone. It's certainly not how to work in a quarry. And it is most definitely not a lesson in how to cash a check, although this does play into the degree. My Brothers, the main lesson of this degree is integrity. The allusion is that the Young Fellowcraft submitted another's work instead of his own, hoping to profit from it, and not have to work quite so hard. There is a favorite quote of mine — "Integrity is doing the right thing, even when no one is looking". And THIS is the lesson of the Mark Master.

We are all faced, sometimes daily, with the opportunity to do what is right, even when no one is looking, even when no one else will know. What do you do with that opportunity when it comes up? If you are the man that I know you to be personally, because of our time together working in the quarries, and you're being a Mason, I know what you would do – you do the right thing not because it is simple, but because it is right and good. But there is another chance when you look at the other side of that Mark coin. What do you do when everyone's looking, and that, I feel is a more important question.

It can be easy to decide, do the right thing or the wrong thing, when no one knows that decision is being made. It is simple to return a wallet, or to pocket the cash inside, when Scott doesn't know it was dropped, or that you picked it up. It's easy to walk by the kitchen, see a pile of dishes, and just put them through the dishwasher when the Scouts forget to do it. It's simple to pick up a flat of water and toss it in the refrigerator on a Saturday afternoon when you know that there is none there, and the OES are going to be using the building. But look at the converse.

How easy is it to stand up for a cause that you believe to be right when everyone is looking? How easy was it for Rosa Parks to take the seat on the bus, in the face of hatred and prejudice, potential physical abuse or even death?

Is it simple to stand up to the president of your company against his or the company's systematic abuses of the rights of their employee, especially when you may be fired or face those same injustices? Are you as willing to face imprisonment for standing up for your rights in the face of government oppression, even if you should lose your freedom or life?

Brethren, if Integrity is made and defined by doing what's right when no one is looking, then I suggest that Integrity is tested and hardened when you do w hat's right when EVERYONE is looking. We have all stood up for someone that was being abused, was being wrongly prosecuted.

We have all had times where we could have walked away. Do you choose to do what's right because it is right, or do you choose to do so because you fear others knowing that you did not do the right thing?

I would hope that, given the choice, you would do it because it is right, and we do the right thing, whether we are seen doing it or not. Measuring ourselves by the square of virtue. And in the end, that is what forges our character.

Blessed are the curious, for they shall have adventures!


