I know what you are thinking, if you are a true Minnesota nice person - Conflict = BAD! I would challenge that thought though. Destructive conflict is obviously bad, but is there a good conflict? While there is the obvious definition of conflict as a disagreement, argument or being at variance with, there is also a more positive definition. To diverge, to differ and

contrast. Isn't this one of the better ways to come to a solution to a problem?
