It reminds me of how we should treat each other and how we would want to be treated ourselves. Masonry is not a social club, it's a Fraternity where good men work constantly to be better.

Being your Master at Anoka Lodge has been an honor, but our work is not done. Each year, at this time, we prepare ourselves for a new slate of officers to carry us forward for the next twelve (12) months. PLEASE come to Lodge on November 6<sup>th</sup> and vote for the LEADERS of your Lodge. Yes, you might say "tradition prevailing" for the upcoming officers, but your support for them is very important. Speaking of remarkable people, let's not forget about our Veterans. If you have never seen a "table for the fallen soldier", I will try to explain it.

The table: set for one, usually small, symbolizing the frailty of one isolated prisoner. The table is usually set close to, or within sight of, the entrance to the dining room. For large events, such as a Table Lodge, the table is set for six places: members of the five armed services (Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, and Coast Guard) and a sixth place setting reminiscent of the civilians who died during service alongside the armed forces or missing during armed conflict. The table is round to represent everlasting concern on the part of the survivors for their missing loved ones.

The tablecloth is white, symbolic of the purity of their intentions to respond to their country's call to arms. The single red rose in the vase, signifies the blood that many have shed in sacrifice to ensure the freedom of our beloved United States of America. This rose also reminds us of the family and friends of our missing comrades who keep the faith, while awaiting their return.

The red ribbon represents the love of our country, which inspired them to answer our nation's call. The slice of lemon on the bread plate represents the bitter fate of the missing. The salt that is sprinkled on the bread plate: symbolic of the countless fallen tears of the families as they wait the word of their loved one. The inverted glass: represents the fact that the missing and fallen cannot partake.

The Bible represents the strength gained through faith to sustain those lost from our country, founded as one nation under God. The lit candle: reminiscent of the light of hope which lives in our hearts to illuminate their way home, away from their captors, to the open arms of a grateful nation.

Finally, the empty chair: the missing and fallen are absent from our ceremony, but never from our hearts. GOD BLESS OUR VETERANS

It is our hope to meet up for some good fellowship and conversation. All are welcome to come and join us! Please contact WB Dave Emery at 763-755-2431 for more information.




Greetings Wayfaring Men of Anoka #30,
