1. It's possible that there were three St Valentines. The first was a physician/priest was in Rome in the third century. With St Marius, he comforted Christians who were persecuted by Emperor Claudius II. He was arrested, tortured, condemned to death, beheaded for his beliefs. This is the most common origin of the February Feast



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- Day. The second was Bishop of Interamna (60 miles outside of Rome. He, too, was arrested, scourged, and beheaded by Emperor Claudius II. The third was martyred in Africa with several companions, but not much else is known of him. The only common thing about these three men is that they died for the love of God.
- 2. The custom of showing our love and affection date back to the Middle Ages. During this time, English and French birds began mating on February 14th. Chaucer even wrote about it in one of his poems: *For this was on Seynt Valentyne's day. When every foul cometh there to choose his mate.* So, in addition to our Saints, it was the bird's behavior that added to the mystique of the festival, giving humans another definition of love to emphasize the affection.
- 3. While St. Valentine is the patron saint of lovers, engaged couples and happy marriages, there is another little-known fact. He is also the patron Saint of young people and of epilepsy. While there is little else that would tie him to his other duties, it's like I said... a fact....

As the darkness of the long nights continue to wear on this winter, I urge you to think, with love, about your Brethren. We know that sometimes, these people need more love than hatred, and we all hope that by displaying this love, we may be able to turn them towards good. We also know those who need love and affection because they are forgotten by the world. The homeless, the poor of soul, those who have lost everything in this world, only to have the love of the next in our sights. Finally, there are those whom "should just know that they are "loved". These are often aching to hear someone just say, "You are loved". We all can take a few moments out of our day to share the love with these people.

No rite of Freemasonry has come into its own so much as the series of degrees known as the Cryptic Rite, also known as the Cryptic Masons. Its popularity is well deserved for there are no more beautiful or meaningful degrees in all Freemasonry that those conferred in the Council of Cryptic Masons. One reason for its popularity is that it completes a story, a Masonic allegory. Freemasonry is very philosophical and teaches its ideals by allegory or story. This philosophy is moralistic and religious however Freemasonry is not a religion., nor a substitute for one. A requirement for membership in Freemasonry is a professed belief in God and eternal life. It is mandatory that a man profess a personal faith in a Supreme Being prior to becoming a Freemason. Freemasonry never attempts to

alter any one's beliefs. Freemasonry offers no theology or plan of salvation. However, it does offer a moral plan to use in this world. Leaving the Mason to look to his religion for salvation into the next world.

Ancient Cryptic Masonry centers around the story of the preservation, loss and recovery of the Word. The Word represents man's search for life's purpose and the nature of GOD. Symbolic Freemasonry, as in the Lodge, teaches of the loss of the Word and hope for its recovery. Royal Arch Masonry, as in the Chapter, teaches its recovery. Cryptic Masonry, as in the Council, completes this story by teaching of the Word's initial preservation.

The one day to Chapter is on February 1st, February 22nd for Council, and Commandery on March 7th. I know many brothers are starting their York Rite journey and i hope all of them enjoy the degrees as much as i have.
