Greetings from the East..... by way of Brooklyn Park!

A happy June to all of you! There have been so many ups and downs this past month, it's hard to go through them all right now. We have had both openings and closings in our world: restaurants with outside seating opening, the return to in-person Masonry (kind of). We have seen more cancelations such as the Grand York Rite Sessions, our Job's Daughters state and international meetings. But something that I want to talk about this Month is the Hero's Journey.



The journey is a literary formula for all "Great" adventures. It could be Star Wars, Harry Potter, The Iliad and the Odyssey or any great work of fiction. Monsters, heroes, challenge, great treasures, epic enemies. All these great works of fiction have the similar formula, one that can apply to all of us at this time of challenge. I hope that when you look through this path, that you find yourselves at some point on the path, and that you are looking to the next stage. What are these steps? Glad you asked!

The Ordinary World - Much the way it sounds, the Ordinary World means that your journey has yet to start. Before they start their journey, the hero contemplates their own ... normalness. Brother Lance lives a good life, filled with charitable acts, chances for education and learning, and his family.

Call to Adventure – This is all about kicking our hero out of their "normal" and into the path to greatness. We see Brother Lance again in his living room, watching the nightly news, realizing that it is yet another month without a Stated Communication. His journey has started, and perhaps he knows it, but maybe he does not. Isn't that the best type of journey? But he gets a call from the Worshipful Master, asking him to take on a new task for the Lodge. We need him to be a Mentor during this time, to make sure our new candidates stay engaged.

Refusal of the call – Our hero, Brother Lance has received the call to action. He knows that the Master needs his help, but there is a problem. He has been idle so long, he is no longer conversant with our Ritual, with our modes of recognition. It's been months, he hasn't performed any of the ritual. He's probably forgotten more about the technical aspects of Masonry than he ever remembered. He says, "thanks but not really able to do that."

Meeting the mentor – every good hero needs a mentor – the Hero's Hero. In this case, the Worshipful Master displays his Wisdom. He thinks for a few moments, and then launches into the counter. "Well, remember, you are not going to be alone in this Lance. Brother Hans is going to be right there with you. He will help you out. What do you think? You up to the challenge?" Of course, we know he is! Brother Lance has now started the Hero's Journey in earnest.

Crossing the first threshold – our hero Brother Lance is ready and committed to his Journey. This is the start of the Second Act of this epic. Brother Lance strikes out and crosses the first barrier – making contact with Brother Barron. From this point forward, there is no turning back! Here he meets the first guardian of the Threshold – perhaps his very cute child, who wants him to stay home. But Brother Lance, in true hero form, continues onward.

Tests, Allies, Enemies - When we step into the Special World, we notice a definite shift. The Hero might be discombobulated by this unfamiliar reality and its new rules. This is generally one of the longest stages in the story, as our protagonist gets to grips with this new world. Brothers Lance and Barron are working together on that challenging Obligation, the signs of the Degree, and Masonry in general. He meets new allies (other Brothers, WB Terrance) and antagonists (his own mind telling him to stay home, his neighbor who thinks the whole virus is the work of the Government).

Approach to the inmost cave – The inmost cave is rarely a physical location. Instead, the "inmost cave" refers to the most dangerous spot in the other realm — whether that's the villain's chambers, the lair of the fearsome dragon, or the Death Star. Almost always, it is where the ultimate goal of the quest is located. Brother Hans has decided that there should be a mock-prove up and has reached out with the new In-person rules to do so in the Lodge. While Brother Lance is not performing, his Brother is, and our Hero is there to assist!

Ordeal - Of all the tests the Hero has faced, none have made them hit rock bottom — until now. Brother Lance must now confront his greatest fear and if he makes it through, he will be forever transformed. It's a critical moment for the protagonist, one which will inform every other decision or action he will take in the future. The Ordeal is sometimes not the climax of the story. There is more to come. But you can think of it as the main event of the second act — the one in which the Hero actually earns the title of "Hero." Brother Lance steps forth with Brother Barron and gives the Dugard and sign.

Reward – Riches! Our intrepid Hero, Brother Lance, has again reached the end of the act. He steps forward and is rewarded with the Wages of a Fellowcraft. However, this time they don't ring as hollow as they have in the past. This time, he sees the smile beaming from Brother Barron as, with his help, he finishes the mock-prove-up. But like all great stories, this is not the end, just the beginning.

The Road Back – The beginning of the Third Act shows the Hero on the way back to the Ordinary World once more. More precisely, our Brother Lance now has to deal with the ramifications of his heroic ordeal. He now is seen as a great Mentor himself! He has shown that he can teach and lead, and that can be a challenge, and cause even more fear!

Resurrection – This is not a true resurrection, but more a figurative one. In this final scene, the antagonist gets one last shot at our Hero. Brother Lance has survived the first test, but the true test remains at the next Stated Communication where the Lodge can experience the work of our TWO heroes now. This time, however, Brother Barron stumbles during the Obligation. It's kind of that near-death situation where there is another Ordeal, but our Hero comes out stronger! Will this be the end of our Hero, or merely the beginning?

It's all figurative, it's all the license of the author of movies, books, and radio dramas. You can fit in any hero – Luke Skywalker, Harry Potter, Bilbo Baggins, Brother Lance. You only have to look to see what's out there, and where your own heroic journey can start. To quote from the movie "Up" (another great Hero's journey) "Adventure is out there!" Be on the watch for it, and don't be afraid to delve into the jungle once more with your Brothers. Until then, grab some popcorn and an obscenely large diet coke and enjoy the show!

To our Anoka Masonic Family-


The Jobies of Bethel 48 hope this finds all of you well-both physically and emotionally.



Greetings from the Scottish Rite,

As we continue into our 3rd month of being separated from each other and the activities we love, I thought now would be a good time to share some History about the Minneapolis Valley of the Rite.

Our Valley was established in 1873, led by Illustrious Brother Alfred Elisha Ames. It followed the Valley of Saint Paul that had already been conducting the work for





The Valley grew fast and soon chartered the Chapter of the Rose Croix in the State. Sadly, Illustrious Brother Ames died in September of 1874 and never saw the Valley grow to putting on all 32 Degrees of the Scottish Rite. We did have the honor of having Albert Pike visit our Valley and confer the 32nd Degree 1879.

The Valley Originally met in the rooms of the Minneapolis Lodge #19 and moved to renting space at Masonic Temple at the Corner of Hennepin

and 6th Street.

We moved in the building on Dupont and Franklin Avenues, an old Methodist Church in 1915. The church was named after a Brother Mason, Bishop Fowler who was Grand Commander of the Knights Templar of Minnesota and those influences can still be seen within the building itself. Some of you may remember how we celebrated our centennial celebration in 2015





The history of our Valley, its beginnings and all we do today were shared last year during the "Open Doors" event for the City of Minneapolis where over 3200 visitors came by the valley for tour and information. We hope that this year's event will not be canceled so that others can share in the wonderful architecture and art.

Here's a document to reflect back on for years to come. Enjoy.

Just so I NEVER forget..... April 2, 2020

- -Gas price a mile from home is \$1.49 (about a month ago it was average \$2.20).
- -School cancelled yes cancelled (students left March 17 and wouldn't return until??? It gets longer every day).
- -Self-distancing measures on the rise.
- -Tape on the floors at grocery stores and others to help distance shoppers (6ft) from each other.
- -Limited number of people inside stores, therefore, lineups outside the store doors.
- -Special early shopping hours for seniors and immune compromised only.
- -Limited store hours (Walmart, Cub foods are usually 24 hours, now only 7a-7p).
- -Non-essential stores and businesses mandated closed.
- -Restaurants are curb side pick or delivery only.

- -Parks, trails, entire cities locked up.
- -Entire sports seasons cancelled.
- -Concerts, tours, festivals, entertainment events cancelled.
- -Weddings, family celebrations, holiday gatherings cancelled.
- -No masses, churches are closed.
- -No gatherings of 50 or more, then 20 or more, now no gatherings of 5 or more.
- -Don't socialize with anyone outside of your home.
- -Children's outdoor play parks are closed.
- -We are to distance from each other.
- -Shortage of masks, gowns, gloves for our front-line workers.
- -Shortage of ventilators for the critically ill.
- -Panic buying sets in and we have no toilet paper, no disinfecting supplies, no paper towel no laundry soap, no hand sanitizer.
- -Shelves are bare.
- -Manufacturers, distilleries and other businesses switch their lines to help make visors, masks, hand sanitizer and PPE.
- -Government closes the border to all non-essential travel.
- -Fines are established for breaking the rules.
- -Stadiums and recreation facilities open up for the overflow of Covid-19 patients.
- -Press conferences daily from the President. -Daily updates on new cases, recoveries, and deaths.
- -Government incentives to stay home.
- -Barely anyone on the roads.
- -People wearing masks and gloves outside.
- -Essential service workers are terrified to go to work.
- -Medical field workers are afraid to go home to their families.
