Bacon Wrapped Oreos

Heat the oven to 275. Cut the slices of bacon in half and wrap each half around an Oreo. Don't wrap tight because the bacon shrinks. Put the overlap seam on the bottom and put them in a foil pan. Sprinkle with Kosher salt. Cook uncovered for 1 1/2 to 2 hours or until the bacon is to your liking. Remove from the oven and cool. Trust me when I say that's important because hot molten lava is still hot, even if it's an Oreo.
