Winter closed our food truck down leaving us with two charities that we weren't able to help this year. Namely, Hope 4 Youth and Stable Pathways. An email went out to try to collect what donations we could for these organizations that do so much to help our community. If you are at all able to make even a small donation, please do so by sending a check or paying online through the Anoka Masons website.

Like summer sausage but don't have the equipment? Did you know the melting point of plastic wrap is 275 degrees? Here's a recipe that takes advantage of that:

Homemade Summer Sausage

5 pounds ground beef

¼ cup Morton Tenderquick

- 1 teaspoon cayenne pepper (2 if you like it spicier)
- 2 teaspoons ground black pepper
- 1 tablespoon garlic powder
- 1 tablespoon brown sugar
- 2½ teaspoons mustard powder

Mix the spices with the meat. Refrigerate for at least one day.

Shape it into 5 loaves, 1.5 - 2 inches in diameter and about 10 to 12 inches long. Place on an 18 inch piece of plastic wrap and roll up tightly. Knead it to work out any air bubbles and prick them with a pin. Twist the ends shut.

Pre-heat your oven to 225. Place the sausage on a baking sheet and cook for about an hour or until the internal temperature reaches 150-155. Take it out and let it cool. Put it in the fridge and let the flavors blend and mellow for 12 hours to 5 days. Will stay good frozen for up to 6 months.
