From Brother Gary Mohn.....

It is at the request of WB Tim Galvin that I'm writing this. He requested it be about "getting to know me". My position at Anoka #30 is Assistant Chaplin. I am Father Thomas Bigelow's backup, he's the real Priest, I'm not. I took this position in roughly 2015 when I joined Anoka #30 by transferring from Lake Harriet Lodge.

The two single best things I have ever done for myself are easy to list. First, I married the love of my life, a most wonderful woman named Debbie. We have been married 44 years this year. The second-best thing I did is I became a Mason. That was even before I met my Wife.

I was born and lived in Minneapolis. In 1970, after graduating from the University of Wisconsin Stout, I took my first job of teaching in Racine Wisconsin. It was Racine that I was raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason in 1973. Life was good in Racine, but my father needed help with his own business, and I returned to Minneapolis. We moved up here into Nowthen in 1991 and since it is a long drive to Lake Harriet Lodge from here, I seldom went. As my retirement neared the yearning to be active in Lodge returned and



after attending several, I choose to become a member of Anoka #30. There I found total acceptance, friendship, and brotherhood at my first meeting. Anoka #30 is a Lodge I love, and I am proud of being a member.

My Masonic history is rather lengthy. My Great-Great-Grandfather was a Master Mason and Past Master. My Grand Father was also, as was my own Father. I joined Lake Harriet DeMolay in the 1960's while still in high school and went through the chairs. Upon my return to Minneapolis, I joined Joppa Lodge #300. It was located within a block of the Scottish Rite and was a great very active lodge. I went through all the chairs and was elected Master in 1979. It was a great year that I am proud of. I can say I have held all office's, except Secretary and Treasurer, and given all lectures. In 2003 Joppa was forced to move from the building they rented, and they merged with Lake Harriet Lodge.

This will be my 48th year as a Mason. Through Masonry I have changed my own life for the better. I have met a multitude of close friends and men who I respect. Through Masonry I have learned the importance of honesty, dignity, hope, faith, and brotherhood. It has been a journey of self-growth that no man can achieve alone, but by surrounding yourself other good men – that growth is possible. The secret to life in Masonry is involvement. To all our members, especially our newest, I stress get involved. Volunteer to help when you can. In the kitchen, event setting up, event clean up. It's during this involvement that you meet new friends, learn about Masonry and start your growth.

I have not attended or been able to be active at Anoka #30 for about a year now. We blame it on the Covid Virus. A person does not get to be this old by being dumb. My wife and I have followed all the rules, we wear our masks, and we stay home. We recently finally got our Covid Vaccine shots. For us the future is now looking brighter. In the future as our vaccines "kick in", I will be returning to lodge and a more normal life. Thank you.

Aaron Brendel, Junior Steward

I grew up the only child of a single mother. I didn't have any relatives who were Masons. I don't think I even knew what it was. Yet here I am a Free Mason for the last 29 years!

When I was 14, unbeknownst to me, my neighbor, Virgil Sellers, was the Grand Commander of the Knights Templar in Iowa. Virgil was the kindest old man who would always stop and say hello to me when he saw me outside playing. I often would see him coming home in his regalia and I always asked to see his funny feather hat and sword every time! One day, my Mother and I were outside raking leaves and Virgil comes out to talk to us. He tells me that he knows of a club for young men that I might like and asks if I would be willing to have one of the members and an adult advisor come over to the house and tell me all about it. A few days later, a friend I knew from school and an Advisor, the man who would years later sign my Blue Lodge Petition, stopped by the house and told me all about DeMolay. How had I never known this existed? Why had I been missing out until then? Sign me up!

I took to DeMolay like a moth to a flame and helped expand it locally to the point that nearly every young man in my High School was a member. I did everything. I was a ritualist at heart and competed in several national competitions as well as attended the DeMolay International Congress sessions twice. I lived and breathed DeMolay! During my time as an Active DeMolay, I served as Master Councilor of my chapter twice and served at the State level as the State Senior Councilor for two years. I was honored with the DeMolay Chevalier, which to date is my most prized possession and memory. My Chapter Dad, Gary Shaulis, was my mentor, role model, and friend so it was only natural that when I turned 18, I petitioned his Lodge, Equity #131 in Janesville, Iowa. He signed my petition, guided me through the process and raised me.

Technically speaking (shhh, don't tell anyone this as I think it was against the rules), I petitioned lodge before I was 18 so that my petition could be read, investigated, and voted in enough time so that I could take my 1st degree as close to after my 18th birthday as possible. Why not just wait a couple more months, you ask? Because I was scheduled to be speaking to the Grand Lodge of Iowa at the Annual Communication only a few weeks after my 18th Birthday! What a memory that was, standing in front of hundreds of Masons addressing them not only as a DeMolay, but as a Brother!

In my early 20s, Bridget and I decided to move to Minnesota and started our family. I worked with Minnesota DeMolay for a short while, but as the pulls of home and career grew stronger, I dropped off the Masonic map for awhile as I focused on what was most important. I still maintained my membership to Equity Lodge #131, but I had not transferred to a Minnesota lodge until about 15 years ago when I found my way to Anoka Lodge. It may not be my first Masonic Home. But Home it is!

Also, when I found my way back to Lodge, I found my way back to DeMolay as well. I started working with Robbinsdale Chapter and eventually was instrumental in bringing DeMolay back to Anoka Lodge. In 2014, I was nominated and elected to become a Deputy Member of the DeMolay International Supreme Council, which is the governing body for DeMolay International comprised of only Master Masons. I served as a non-voting Deputy for a couple years before being asked to take on the position of Executive Officer of Minnesota DeMolay, which I am still currently serving as.

And while I often get called "the DeMolay guy" my service to youth doesn't end there. I am also very active as an adult in Job's Daughters, Bethel #48 in Anoka. I currently am serving as the Associate Bethel Guardian and have

previously served as the Guardian Treasurer and the Director of Promotions. I have served on several Grand Guardian Council committees, and I was blessed to be allowed to coach the 2019 Minnesota Messenger Team as they competed in Kansas City.

In my years as a Master Mason, I have come to realize this; The values we hold as Freemasons are designed to build our life into a metaphorical temple. We each take our rough ashlars, chip away at them so that we can build a solid building that is our life. But all buildings need a strong foundation if they are to stand the test of time. Brothers, there is absolutely "No Stronger Foundation" than that of our Masonic Youth upon which one could build their life upon. I am so incredibly blessed that Virgil Sellers shared DeMolay with me. That one conversation he had with 14 year old me while I was out raking my leaves changed my life! It was the spark that lit my flame and led me down the path that gave me my Anoka Masonic Family.

Greetings Brothers,




